HERE IS OUR ANNUAL UPDATE:

We are profoundly grateful to God for a deeply meaningful life; we saw God communicating His love around the world and enabling us to have a part. God continues to transform people who engage with the Bible, whatever their culture and circumstances. Your part in all of this has been crucial. "Our" work has actually been a team effort with you and others, including many who are already receiving their rewards in heaven. Thank you for supporting us with your prayers, donations and practical help. Here is a quick summary of the work God directed us to do during our 60 years with Wycliffe Bible Translators.

- 1. 20+ years with the Bahinemo people in New Guinea. The church there continues to serve Jesus. Our son Jamey uses the profit from his book about that work to train some of their young people as teachers and medical workers.
- 2. This overlapped with 5 years study and research that Wycliffe assigned us to, which resulted in Wayne's PhD and my MA in cross-cultural communication.
- 3. 20 years teaching in many other countries, passing on to translators and missionaries what we had discovered about working cross-culturally and encouraging people to engage with the Bible, a process now called Scripture Engagement (SE).
- 4. This overlapped with 20 years teaching at Dallas International University, DIU (which earlier was named GIAL). The MA program we developed in Scripture engagement is now fully staffed by younger teachers whom we mentored. Former students are now working in many countries, passing our insights on to others.

All of the major Bible translation and distribution agencies have come to recognize that Scripture Engagement is necessary to keep Bibles from sitting on shelves. Missiology, the scientific study of missions and mission methods, now includes the subfield of Scripture Engagement.

Wayne continues to write and present topics in academic conferences. As a professor emeritus at DIU, he can still use the library and all of its internet resources. Wayne is the senior member of a team that teaches SE (Scripture engagement) in an online non-credit missionary training program. He is also working with others on an app to help people discover which strategies will be effective in encouraging Scripture engagement in specific language groups around the world.

Wayne is currently working with others to provide a thoroughly biblical explanation of the gospel that is more challenging and exciting to modern Americans. It was well received by the Evangelical Missiological Society. Next Spring, he is invited to present it at the annual Great Commission Research Network conference in Florida. During the past 2 years, we have both been slowing down, me (Sally) more than Wayne. We each have a reasonably long list of the ailments of old age. We both visit doctors frequently.
