We will be doing a full 2000-hour inspection on a timed out R66 helicopter that we purchased for a project for this semester. There is no better way to train than by learning 'hands-on', gaining experience on what they will be servicing on the field. As the Director of maintenance, I carry a heavy responsibility with keeping my eyes and hands on everything accomplished because I am the one who must sign it off as airworthy!

Our Son, Austin, and his fiancée, Katelyn continue to work at their respective jobs in Tucson!
