With every new season we can rest assured that change is coming. Such is the case for Valdez. Having been incarcerated for many years, this young man is grateful his life has been renewed.

Raised by his grandparents after his mother was unable to care for him and his father struggled as a single father, Valdez says he appreciates his grandparents stepping in to raise him. "They were the ones who introduced me to Christ." Their unconditional love and taking him to church gave Valdez the stability he needed during his early years. However, in his 20s, Valdez felt the void of not having his parents in his life. "I felt empty." That emptiness led to smoking marijuana, making bad decisions, and drinking alcohol which led to crime and a long journey to spiritual and emotional wholeness. A path he is still on.

In prison, Valdez renewed his relationship with Christ. He enrolled in classes including one to address his dependence on alcohol. "Life behind bars was hard! The loneliness was the hardest," he states. Then one day he realized, "Lonely doesn't mean alone with God in your life."

During his incarceration Valdez dealt with the loss of his parents and grandparents. They all died. When it was time for his release the pressure of being a husband, father and the unknowns overcame him. With one year left he gave in to life's pressure and another bad choice was made. He realized then that going back to his old ways wasn't an option anymore.

His parole stipulated that he had to enroll in a program. Someone told him about Rescue Ministries of Mid-Michigan. After being at the Mission Valdez is happy to say, "I made the right choice this time."

Valdez enrolled in and completed the Impact Shelter Classes including Supportive Parenting and Becoming a Responsible Tenant, to name a few. After completing the classes, he qualified for Impact Designs services and recently moved into his own apartment. "The Mission has allowed me to grow and act accordingly as a man. I like who I am now."

Often our New Year's resolutions are very focused upon ourselves. I like to challenge all those taking the time to read this newsletter that we focus more this year on God's message to live for others. For example, consider helping to prepare and serve a meal, assist with moving someone into their new apartment with Impact Designs, work in a clothing room, sort and assemble hygiene packets.
